

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
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

Happy 73rd birthday, Philippine Marine Corps! Together, let us forge ahead, united and determined, towards a brighter and more secure future for our maritime nation.







MARINE & MAGHINE:

AN INTERVIEW WITH THE CDR A.I. BOT

Pvt Rochelle Walat PN(M) and CDR A.I Bot

Pvt Rochele N Walat PMC joined the Philippine Marine Corps in 2021 under Special Enlistment Program. She is currently assigned with the R3 Operations Section of the Headquarters Coastal Defense Regiment. Pvt Wala is a graduate of BS Industrial Engineering. She has been involved in crafting several concept papers of the Regiment to and has been actively participating in several key undertaking related to the execution of the CDR 9-year Organizational Development Plan.

CDR A.I. Bot was activated by R6, CDR in the 1st quarter of 2023 as part of the overall Knowledge Management System (KMS) of the Coastal Defense Regiment. This ongoing initiative starting way back in 2020 is ably headed by Major Jean Paul San Gabriel PN(M).

Intrigued by what knowledge current Artificial Intelligence can offer on topics of interest to the Philippine Marine Corps, I interviewed the CDR A.I. Bot by asking Three (3) questions in order to draw objective insights from a computer machine's cognitive recesses.

PVT WALAT: Can you describe how coastal defense can best work for defending an archipelago?

correction of diverse resources and strategies. Here is a general overview of how coastal defense works in an archipelago:

1. Prioritization and Threat Assessment: The first step in coastal defense in an archipelago is identifying the strategic importance and

vulnerabilities of different islands and coastal areas. A thorough assessment of potential threats, such as hostile forces, piracy, smuggling, or illegal fishing, helps determine where defensive measures should be focused.

- 2. Surveillance and Monitoring: Effective surveillance and monitoring systems are crucial in an archipelago. This involves deploying radar systems, coastal patrol vessels, maritime patrol aircraft, and other sensors to cover a wide area and detect any suspicious activities or threats. Remote sensing technologies can also be utilized to monitor activities in hard-to-reach areas.
- 3. Interagency
 Collaboration: Coordinating
 efforts among various
 agencies and stakeholders is
 essential in an archipelago.
 This includes the military,
 coast guard, law enforcement
 agencies, intelligence services,

local authorities, and even neighboring countries. Regular informationsharing, joint exercises, and collaborative operations strengthen coastal defense capabilities.

- 4. Mobile and Flexible
 Assets: Given the scattered
 nature of islands in an
 archipelago, maintaining
 mobile and flexible assets
 is crucial. This includes
 having fast-response vessels,
 helicopters, and surveillance
 drones that can quickly reach
 and patrol different islands
 and coastal regions. Mobile
 defense forces, such as naval
 infantry or marines, can be
 stationed strategically to
 respond rapidly to threats.
- 5. Maritime Domain
 Awareness: Developing a
 comprehensive understanding
 of the maritime domain in an
 archipelago is essential for
 effective coastal defense. This
 includes establishing maritime
 domain awareness systems
 that integrate data from
 various sources, such as radar

systems, AIS (Automatic Identification System), satellite imagery, and local fishermen or residents who act as human sensors. 6. Networked Defense: Creating a networked defense system enhances the effectiveness of coastal defense in an archipelago. This involves connecting surveillance assets, coordinating communication systems, and utilizing informationsharing platforms. It enables real-time response, quick decision-making, and the consolidation of forces to counter threats more efficiently.

7. Deterrence and Collaboration: Demonstrating a strong deterrence posture and promoting collaboration among regional partners are important aspects of coastal defense in an archipelago. Developing joint patrols, sharing intelligence, conducting joint exercises, and establishing integrated response mechanisms helps to deter potential aggressors and enhances regional security.

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Environmental **Protection: Coastal** defense measures in an archipelago should also consider environmental protection. Preserving fragile ecosystems, protecting biodiversity, and minimizing the impact on marine life are crucial for sustainable coastal defense. Balancing defense requirements with environmental considerations is vital for long-term security and sustainability. It's important to note that the specific implementation of coastal defense in an archipelago will depend on the size, geopolitical context, topography, resources, and threat perceptions of the specific archipelago in question.

PVT WALAT: How can coastal defense best work in conjunction with amphibious forces?

correction to enhance overall defensive capabilities and execute amphibious

operations. Here's how coastal defense works in conjunction with amphibious forces:

- 1. Defense of Beachheads: When conducting amphibious operations, amphibious forces establish beachheads on enemy coasts or contested coastal areas. Coastal defense plays a vital role in protecting these beachheads from hostile counterattacks. Combined arms operations, integrating coastal defense units and amphibious forces, ensure the defense of the initial landing zone.
- 2. Security and Perimeter Defense: Coastal defense units provide additional security and perimeter defense around amphibious landing sites, maintaining a defensive posture to prevent enemy infiltration or attacks. This includes deploying surveillance systems, laying obstacles, establishing defensive positions, and conducting patrols to ensure the security of the landing area and subsequent

operations.

- Naval Gunfire Support: Coastal defense units can provide naval gunfire support to amphibious forces during an assault or subsequent operations. This involves utilizing naval guns, artillery, or shore-based missile systems to engage enemy targets, suppress defenses, and support the advance of amphibious forces. Coastal defense units can bring their firepower to bear against enemy positions in coordination with the amphibious assault.
- Intelligence, Surveillance, and Reconnaissance (ISR): Coastal defense units can contribute to intelligence gathering, surveillance, and reconnaissance efforts in support of amphibious operations. They can provide valuable information about enemy coastal defenses, obstacles, minefields, and other potential threats that may impact the successful execution of the amphibious mission. This information helps amphibious forces plan

and adapt their operations accordingly.

- Force Protection: Coastal defense units assist in force protection measures for amphibious forces operating within the littoral environment. They can provide anti-aircraft and antimissile defense capabilities, counter-swimmer operations, and anti-boat/ship measures to safeguard amphibious assets and personnel from enemy threats, including air, surface, or subsurface attacks. 6. Joint Training and
- Integration: Coastal defense units and amphibious forces often conduct joint training exercises and drills to enhance their interoperability and coordination. This enables them to refine tactics, techniques, and procedures for effective joint operations and seamless integration of forces during amphibious assault and subsequent phases.
- 7. Post-Landing Security: After the initial amphibious landing, coastal defense units can secure and defend the

coastal zone, protecting lines of communication, supply routes, and rear areas. This allows amphibious forces to consolidate their beachhead and expand their operations inland with reduced vulnerability to enemy attacks from the coast. The collaboration between coastal defense units and amphibious forces ensures a comprehensive approach to littoral operations, combining forces to safeguard the success of amphibious missions, extend defensive perimeters, and provide security during subsequent operations By integrating their capabilities and expertise, coastal defense and amphibious forces enhance overall offensive and defensive capabilities in coastal environments.

PVT WALAT: How can marine missile capabilities enhance amphibious operations?

CDRBOT(AI): Missile capabilities can enhance marine amphibious operations in several ways:

- 1. Deterrence: The presence of a credible missile capability can serve as a deterrent against potential adversaries, thereby preventing or minimizing the likelihood of conflicts or aggression. The ability to threaten targets with long-range missiles can discourage adversaries from engaging in hostile actions against amphibious forces.
- 2. Suppression of Enemy Defenses: Missiles can be utilized to neutralize or suppress enemy air defenses, coastal defenses, and other key targets that could pose a threat to amphibious operations. By targeting and disabling these defenses, missile capabilities can create safe corridors for amphibious forces to conduct their operations.
- 3. Precision Strike: Missiles with precision guidance systems can accurately engage and neutralize

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- specific targets, such as enemy command and control centers, communication installations, or key infrastructure. This enables amphibious forces to swiftly degrade the enemy's capabilities and disrupt their operations.
- 4. Anti-Ship Capability: Missile systems that have anti-ship capabilities can provide effective naval firepower against enemy warships and vessels. Such missiles can target and engage hostile naval assets, thus providing a layer of protection for the amphibious forces and enabling them to operate in littoral or coastal environments more safely.
- 5. Expeditionary Fires: Missile systems can provide expeditionary fire support to the amphibious task force, offering a long-range strike capability against targets deep in the enemy's territory. This enhances

the operational reach and flexibility of the marine amphibious forces.

Force Protection: Missile defense systems, such as anti-missile interceptors or surface-toair missiles, can safeguard the amphibious forces by intercepting and neutralizing incoming enemy missiles or air threats. This helps to enhance the survivability and protection of personnel, platforms, and critical assets involved in the operation. It is important to note that the integration and coordination of missile capabilities within the broader amphibious operation plan require careful consideration and synchronization with other elements, including naval, air, and ground forces.

We Have a Problem

he Philippines is an archipelagic state that emphasizes the unity of land and waters, and requiring that baselines be drawn by connecting the appropriate points of the "outermost islands to encircle". Thus, the islands of the Philippines shall be regarded as a single unit, so that the waters around, between, and connecting the islands of its archipelago, irrespective of their breadth and dimensions, shall form part of its internal waters and subject to its exclusive sovereignty.

We identify the issue over the West Philippine Sea (WPS) [in the eastern parts of the South China Sea (SCS)] as the foremost security challenge to our sovereignty and territorial integrity-China being the primary security threat. This bears a direct, great, and adverse toll on the free and open Sea Lines of Communications (SLOCs) in the SCS where China has built several artificial islands installed with strategic defense assets within and surrounding the Philippines Exclusive Economic Zone (EEZ).

These artificial islands pose a grave danger as direct threats to the Philippines as they adversely affect the country's sea control in its maritime domain and makes the country susceptible to the naval force of China.

Furthermore, China conducts persistent "grayzone" operations within the Philippines' EEZ and territorial waters. The deployment of Chinese vessels in the area have also been preventing Filipinos from accessing its natural resources and have been hindering the operations of Philippine public and naval vessels in the region.

Furthermore, China's nine-dash line illegally encloses about 85.7% of the entire South China Sea, equivalent to 3.0-million square kilometers of the 3.5-million square kilometers total surface area of the South China Sea, where over one-half of the world's seaborne trade passes,

valued at US\$5.3T annually.

At stake for the Philippines in the WPS under China's illegal nine-dash line are the following:

(1) about 80 percent of its EEZ comprising 381,000 square kilometers of maritime space, including the entire Reed Bank and part of the Malampaya gas field; and

(2) 100 percent of its Extended Continental Shelf (ECS) estimated at over 150,000 square kilometers of maritime space.

This unlawful claim illegally encroaches on over 531,000 square kilometers of Philippine EEZ and ECS, including all the fishery, oil, gas, and mineral resources found within this vast area, which is larger than the total land area of the Philippines of about 300,000 square kilometers. This Chinese aggression is the gravest external threat to the Philippines since World War II.

We Have A Solution

Manned by Marines". As the nation grapples with protecting its maritime rights, the modern warfare landscape's digital evolution is evident in the Philippine Marine Corps' Archipelagic Coastal Defense Strategy. Central to this strategy is the Coastal Defense Regiment (CDR), which leans heavily on credible defensive capabilities through the Shore-Based Anti-Ship Missile Battalion (SBASM Bn) and the Shore-Based Air Defenses Battalion (SBAD Bn) deployed in strategic coastal maneuver areas.



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The maritime domain, with its vast and intricate landscape, demands a multifaceted defensive approach. One of these approaches is "tag-team" of the SBAD Bn and the SBASM

Bn that offers a robust strategy or solution to address maritime territorial defense challenges.

This strategy is a layered defense mechanism. The outer layer, helmed by the SBASM Bn, focuses on deterring and neutralizing incoming naval threats (read ships), and serves as the primary line of defense against potential naval incursions (in conjunction with the Philippine Fleet). On the other hand, the inner layer, managed by the SBAD Bn, zeroes in on aerial threats by ensuring the skies remain clear of enemy aircrafts, drones, missiles, or rockets (in



conjunction with the PAF). When faced with combined aerial and naval threats, these battalions spring into action with a coordinated response. This means that while the SBASM Bn confronts the naval component, SBAD Bn engages the aerial threats/ adversaries.

War and Technology (Ukraine-Russia Conflict Setting)

In today's evolving realm of modern warfare, technology has redefined battlefield strategies. The Russia-Ukraine conflict vividly showcased how drones can have transformative power and become "game-changers". As drone technology becomes pervasive, even nations without vast technological resources, like Ukraine, harnessed them effectively. Ukraine employed drones not just for surveillance but also for offense thereby dealing significant blows to Russian forces.

On the other hand, drones too have their limitations because in contested airspaces, they face vulnerabilities against sophisticated anti-air defense systems. The Russia-Ukraine conflict shows that traditional military power, marked by sheer numbers and conventional assets, can be toppled by innovative tactics and strategic technology deployments.

Additionally, Ukraine's air defenders have been reported to have saved countless lives by shooting down incoming missiles and drones at a rate of 90%-Kyiv being the best protected city. Ukraine also sunk the Moskva (Russian flagship Black Sea missile cruiser) using a subsonic Neptune anti-ship missile (old Soviet anti-ship missile with a range of 200 miles). Of recent memory in this regard, is when the British lost six ships to missile attacks from Argentinian aircrafts that underlined to navies around the world the vulnerability of ships to missile attacks (Falklands War, 1982).

Call to Action

The CDR and its SBASM and SBAD Battalions are major players in the country's maritime strategic considerations pertaining to maritime defense capabilities. They are imperatives to the defense of our archipelagic/maritime nation and the capabilities that they bring will make the Corps more relevant in defense lenses.




It is in this light that the CDR thanks the PMC and Philippine Navy (PN) leadership for their support all these times in establishing and sustaining the unit and its two battalions as it prays for more support from all members of the Fleet-Marine Team in order to fast-track the realization of these capabilities and bring the custodian units to the level of Mission Capable status.

The accomplishments of the Corps, the PN, and the Armed Forces of the Philippines (AFP) in this era of territorial disputes and external defense operations should no longer be merely based on metrics like ships' steaming time, aircraft flying time, or the infantry's "body counts". Instead, accomplishments should now be measured by the actual freedom and protection that Filipinos can enjoy. Collective accomplishments should translate into Filipinos navigating the SLOCS in the nation's territorial waters and EEZ without fear of external/ internal interferences or threats.

This dream of freely navigating Filipinos in Philippine waters can be better helped (and earlier achieved) under the kind of protection that the Philippine Marine Corps and the Philippine Navy can provide through the Coastal Defense Regiment and its Shore-Based Anti-Ship Missile and Shore-Based Air Defense Battalions.

The joint efforts of the ADRT along with the Ministry of Public Order and Safety (MPOS) of the Bangsamoro Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao (BARMM) has resulted in the cessation of hostilities and amicable settlements between 11 warring families.

Since the transfer of the Marine Battalion Landing Team-2 (MBLT-2) in April 2023 to keep watch over the five municipalities of the Iranun corridor of Maguindanao del Norte, it has faithfully done its share in this peacebuilding effort by securing the areas of conflict.

These settlements are a clear manifestation of the united front of the local government units and the security sector. Moreover, the "Balik-Baril Program" was implemented to supplement the fight against conflict. Nine barangays have undergone this program that has resulted in the surrender of loose firearms and members of Potential Private Armed Groups (PPAGs) within the municipality. In fact, on June 19 and August 22, 2023, two personalities listed in the Maguindanao del Norte Provincial Police Office of members of Potential Private Armed Groups have peacefully surrendered and turned over their loose firearms.

After more than two decades, the promise of development finally makes a breakthrough as the Municipality of Buldon sets on its journey towards becoming a peaceful and progressive community. Tourist spots have been opened and farm-to-market road projects have been intensified. As it remains faithful to its mandated task, the MBLT-2 pledges to sustain peace and order, for development to take deep root and grow for the betterment of the people of Maguindanao del Norte.





or the past 45 years after its activation on July 28, 1978, the Marine Battalion Landing Team-8 remains firmly committed to its mission of maintaining peace and security and supporting community development under its area of operations. Formerly operating in the Southern parts of the Philippines, MBLT-8's redeployment to Northern Luzon greatly contributes to the AFP's shift from security stability operations to external defense mission, territorial defense operations and amphibious seaborne operations. Widely known as Team Peacemaker, MBLT-8 intensified its efforts to become a purveyor of security, peace, and development in Ilocos Norte and Cagayan Province.

Aligned with the Philippine Marine Corps' mandate and archipelagic coastal defense strategy, the Marine Battalion Landing Team-8 actively participated and conducted various exercises that tested the efficiency, and effectiveness of the Corps' existing doctrines.

MBLT-8 executed OPORD BOUBON as part of Exercise "IRUGI", a unilateral exercise initiated by the 4th Marine Brigade with the objective of conducting defensive operations within the unit's area of operations. This boosted operational readiness and situational awareness of every personnel; enabling them to destroy foreign aggressors and clear the maritime and land domain from threats.

Moreover, regular road runs, gun drills, and combative sports are being implemented to enhance skills and proficiency in selfdefense, and to maintain the personnel's physical fitness.

The unit has also been at the forefront of Humanitarian Assistance and Disaster Relief (HADR) Operations following the onslaught of Typhoon Egay and Goring in Northern Luzon. Amidst the threat brought by the calamity, MBLT-8 remained a force the people could rely upon.



The unit served alongside the Philippine Army, Philippine National Police, Bureau of Fire Protection, Provincial Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Office, and other rescue units in the Joint Search, Rescue, and Retrieval Operation of the ill-fated CESSNA 152 plane, which was subsequently discovered at the boundary of Salvacion, Luna, and San Jose, Pudtol, Apayao in August 2023.



MBLT-8 likewise took part in the Nationwide Simultaneous Earthquake Drill (NSED) held within the unit's area of operations as part of its readiness in the event of a devastating tremblor.

To ensure credible coastal defense and security posture, as well as maintain peace and order in its area of operations, MBLT-8 regularly conducts mobility security patrols. In addition, the Philippine Marine Corps, through MBLT-8 also took part in the PH- US Marine Aviation Support Activity (MASA) 2023 following the BALIKATAN Exercise 2023 (BK 38-23).




These exercises were designed to enhance the capabilities of the combined forces specifically in the conduct of aviation-support operations, camp/coastal defense operations, and engineering support.

he Commander, Joint Task Task Force Tawi-Tawi/ 2nd Marine Brigade, Brigadier General Romeo T. Racadio PN(M), led the send-off ceremony for the 1st Civilian Armed Forces Geographical Unit (CAFGU) Active Auxiliary (CAA) Company with Hon. Nurbert M. Sahali, Mayor of Panglima Sugala, and Hon. Jimuel Que, Mayor of Bongao, represented by Hon. Sangkula Nagder Asula, Al-haj, Councilor, at the Naval Station Juan Magluyan, Panglima Sugala on July 6, 2023.

The 1st CAA, led by Cpt Rodel C Baquial (INF) PA, Commanding Officer, 17th Special Forces Company, Philippine Army is under the operational control of the Joint Task Force Tawi-Tawi. It has a total strength of 112 Special Forces-trained civilian volunteers deployed in Bongao and Panglima Sugala. Their mission is to support the regular forces in the protection of life and property; secure vital facilities and public utility; and assist the local government in the delivery of services especially during emergencies. Their deployment is part of Western Mindanao Command's sustainment efforts to strengthen its Territorial Defense Operations (TDO) capability.

BGen Racadio encouraged the troops to effectively use their training acquired from the Army and Marines to protect and serve the people and their communities.



MBLT-6 SHOWCASES AMPHIBIOUS WARFARE PROFICIENCY in E G 5 L G N

fter successfully completing its retraining and refurbishing program earlier this year, Marine Battalion Landing Team-6 (MBLT-6), as the 2nd Marine Amphibious Ready Unit (MARU) of the Philippine Marine Corps (PMC), was deployed to Zamboanga City under the operational control of the Western Mindanao Command (WESMINCOM).

Within a month of its deployment, the MBLT-6, operating as the National Maneuver Amphibious Force (NMAF) of the PMC, demonstrated its capabilities by conducting seaborne maneuvers during a focused military operation (FMO) on Kauluan Island in the Municipality of Al-Barka, Basilan, on March 29, 2023. This FMO was executed in accordance with WESMINCOM Directive and MBLT-6 OPORD "EPIBATAI" aimed at neutralizing remnants of the Basilan-based Abu Sayyaf Group (ASG) under @Khatan and other

lawless elements (LLEs) under @Junga. The Special Operations Platoon-6 (SOP-6) of MBLT-6 was tasked as supporting effort 1 (SE1), to establish a blocking position, while simultaneously providing support to Naval Special Operations Unit-6 (NAVSOU-6) that served as the main effort (ME) during their amphibious raid at the suspected hideout of the remnants of the ASG. With the assistance of PG901, which provided naval gunfire support, NAVSOU-6 and SOP-6 successfully secured the objective and sent the enemy scampering to different directions. Several items were recovered, including two M16 rifles, one M1 Garand rifle, one rifle grenade HE, live ammunition, a cellphone, radios, and various other war materiel. The execution of this focused military operation earned for the MBLT-6 the trust and confidence of both the leadership of the WESTMINCOM and the Naval Forces Western Mindanao (NFWM).

On August 6, 2023, MBLT-6 would once again demonstrate its prowess during its involvement in the execution of OPLAN PAGLALANSAG OMEGA (Implementation of Search Warrant against Loose Firearms) and OPLAN BIG BERTHA spearheaded by the Criminal **Investigation and Detection Group** Regional Field Unit-9 (CIDG RFU-9) against a certain Yashin Mambun who is allegedly engaged in large-scale illegal drug trade and illegal selling of firearms in Basilan, Sulu and Zamboanga City, and who was previously arrested for the crime of murder. SOP-6, NAVSOU-6, Naval Intelligence and Security Group (NISG), together with CIDG RFU-9 successfully conducted Law Enforcement and Support Operation (LESO) through an amphibious raid at the vicinity of Sangbay Small Island in the Municipality of Hadji Muhtamad. This operation resulted in the apprehension of Yashin Mambun and the seizure of crucial evidence in his possession.

The operation resulted in the confiscation of approximately 138.48 grams of suspected illegal drugs (methamphetamine hydro-chloride) with

an estimated value of Php 928,046.00; one unit of AK47 C2 858 Tactical-4V Cal 7.62; one magazine assembly for Cal 7.62; 26 pieces of live ammunition for Cal. 7.62; one unit TEC-KG9, 9mm; one piece magazine assembly for KG9; 27 pieces of live ammunition for 9mm; one piece holster; one unit colt MK IV cal. 45 pistol; one piece magazine assembly for Cal 45 pistol, two units magazine assembly for 9mm KG9, one piece sack; and clothing.

More than seven months after its deployment to the Western Mindanao Command Joint Area of Operations, the MBLT-6 as the 2nd Marine Amphibious Ready Unit of the Philippine Marine Corps has proven itself as a highly mobile, readily deployable, task-oriented Marine unit with combat support and service support elements that can sustain its operations ashore and project its combat power to an offshore island, capable to operate, support, and sustain itself in a hostile operating environment in the conduct of amphibious operations to address threats and disaster emergencies that are national in scope and within the context of joint operations to contribute to the accomplishment of PMC's mission


areas of convergence, and places of revelry were safe and secure.

In the dynamic realm of modern warfare, specialized units play a crucial role in achieving success in the battlefield. 1ST MARINE AMPHIBIOUS READY UNIT CONDUCT JOINT EXERCISE WITH AUSTRALIAN DEFENSE FORCE

he inaugural Exercise Alon held on August 14, 2023, at the Western Command, Puerto Prinsesa in Palawan, marked the first-ever bilateral amphibious exercise between the Armed Forces of the Philippines (AFP) and Australian Defence Force (ADF). The Philippine Marine Corps was proudly represented in this historic event by the Marine Battalion Landing Team-9 (MARU) which returned to Palawan after 15 years

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of operating in Tawi-Tawi, Bataan, and Zambales.

The joint exercise is part of Australia's Indo-Pacific Endeavour (IPE) activity for the year 2023. The IPE is their international engagement initiative to promote security, stability, and stronger partnership in the Southeast Asian and Indian Ocean Region.

As a marine amphibious ready force of the Philippine Marine Corps, the Marine Battalion

Landing Team-9 (MARU) took the opportunity to enhance their skills and effectiveness in accomplishing the unit's mission by participating in exercises involving partner nations. The Marine Battalion Landing Team-9 (MARU) and the Australian Defense Force (ADF) conducted various training activities which included joint patrols, amphibious assaults, and live-fire exercises. s part of the Indo-Pacific Endeavour (IPE), Marines flew to Darwin, Australia to train alongside counterparts from the Australian Defence Force. The IPE is Australia's flagship international engagement activity in the Southeast Asian and Indian Ocean region which began in 2017. It aims to promote security, stability, and stronger partnerships in the Indo-Pacific Region through bilateral and multilateral engagement training, capacity building, and humanitarian efforts. Initially, this exercise was designed for the Philippine Navy, particularly for the Philippine Marine Corps (PMC) for it is focused on Amphibious Operations. As a matter of fact, this exercise was conceived as the PMC-ADF Cooperative Serial, and no less than the Commandant, Philippine Marine Corps, Major General Arturo G Rojas PN(M) named it "Alon," or wave in English. It is defined as "a long body of water curling into an arched form and breaking on the shore." The term "waves" is coined to emphasize the characteristics of amphibious warfare, as a type of offensive military operation that uses naval ships to project ground and air power unto a hostile or potentially hostile shore at a designated landing beach.

However, on May 5, 2023, General Andres

C Centino, PA, the then Chief of Staff Armed Forces of the Philippines articulated the desire to make exercise "Alon" as a joint and combined exercise between the Armed Forces of the Philippines and the Australian Defence Force. Thus, participation of the Philippine Army and Philippine Air Force were added.

On August 9, 2023, 95 participants from the Philippine Marine Corps underwent various trainings in Darwin, Australia such as Helicopter Underwater Escape Training (HUET), Marksmanship/ Live Firing Training, and MV22 (Osprey) Familiarization together with the Australian Defence Force from August 10-14, 2023.

The conduct of trainings with the Australian Defence Force such as the HUET capacitates Marines especially in water survival should there be any untoward incident while utilizing air assets during operations.

After the 5-day training in Darwin, the Marines went back to the Philippines aboard His Majesty Australian Ship (HMAS) Canberra. During the voyage home, exercises such as Military Urban Operation Training (MOUT), Close Quarter Combat, and Virtual Reality Training continued aboard the ship in preparation for the conduct of Air Assault ina Palawan and subsequent Amphibious Assault exercises in Zambales.

These exercises have truly enriched and further capacitated PMC forces. The exchange has likewise enhanced interoperability and understanding of each other's Tactics, Techniques and Procedures (TTPs), and served as a good venue to learn best practices especially in the conduct of amphibious operations.

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
he Philippine Marine Corps traces its roots to the late 1950s, through Armed Forces of the Philippines General Orders 319, which established the 1st Marine Battalion as a unit of the Philippine Naval Patrol. Initially, the 1st Marine Battalion was composed of brave volunteers, which paved the way for the birth of an organization that is rooted in volunteerism and warrior spirit. From this point onward, the Philippine Marine Corps undergoes subsequent changes that eventually lead to what it has currently and proudly become. Today, the Philippine Marine Corps stands on the ready, more than ever, as it transitions from internal security operations—fighting insurgents and terrorists—to territorial defense. Consequently, this transition marked the pivot of the Corps; activating and reorganizing all aspects of the organization as it recognized its vital role in territorial defense vis-a-vis the current geopolitical

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developments between the world's hegemons.

With change being the only constant thing in this world, the Corps goes back to its foundations to effect change by intercalating new and relevant trainings that would capacitate Marines with the essential skills and knowledge necessary to accomplish the PMC's mission. Moreover, as amphibious warfare opens the opportunity for the Armed Forces of the Philippines to become more flexible and mobile, the Marine Corps enhances its own flexibility by considering the best practices of partners and international counterparts; through the conduct of combined exercises; and by availing international schoolings.

The Basic School (TBS), which serves as the primordial source of all Marines, currently trains its new and young officers through the Marine Officer Basic Course



46 (MOBC 46). The Basic School, as part of the Marine Corps Force Development Centre (MCFDC), has also embraced changes that facilitated the establishment of its current MOBC directorates to be new graduates of foreign schoolings. With its course director being 1ST Lieutenant Jaywardene Hontoria PN(M), a graduate of the All Corps Captain Course in Australia, and its Assistant Course Director, 2ND Lieutenant Justine Moriles PN(M), a graduate of the US Marine Officer Basic Course, is a clear manifestation of the PMC setting the bar higher to produce agile, adaptive, and resilient roster of personnel.

Currently, the corps trains its young blood to become more readily capable of conducting amphibious operations. Two months through and four months to go, the MOBC 46 has undergone an integrated training and education program that include different doctrines and additional water phases necessary to produce young officers who highly capable of territorial defense. In its doctrines, the school creates a hybrid of instruction that incorporates both traditional and conventional doctrines with the help of combined concepts from Australia's Land Warfare Centre, which further accentuates our landward maneuvers, and the US Marine

Corps, which enhances our concept of amphibious operations. This allows the school to produce officers that are deployable both in landward and seaward operations, thus contributing to the pursuit of becoming the most-ready unit.

Additionally, in its training, the MOBC 46 has already started its water phase evolution. Starting from basic water breath hold, treading, 200m swim and 20m underwater swim, the course has also integrated the conduct of several water trainings such as tactical night swim (1200m) where students were taught how to navigate and swim through

the dark without breaking formation and maintaining tactical distance; drownproofing where students have their hands and feet tied and is trained to execute a survival swim towards the shore; ditch and donning where students were trained to throw their equipment - weighted suspender tied with M16 rifle - in the water (ditching) and to dive in and wear their equipment underwater (donning) before resurfacing; full combat swim where students were taught to swim with their rifles in assimilating insertion from the water as well as developing a skill in survival swimming; and lastly, tactical small boat operations where students were taught how to conduct tactical operations using our small boat assets which are essential parts of amphibious operations. These trainings pave the way to building marine officers who are adept and equipped with the necessary knowledge and skills founded on readiness.

These initiatives, both in doctrines and trainings that are emplaced at an early stage, provide a corollary of a better-developed and more relevant breed of Marine officers. As such, the Marine Corps continues to improve itself as the standard of readiness and deployment towards the pursuit of upholding our maritime sovereignty.

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ith the 1st Marine Brigade standing watch over strategic areas of the Bangsamoro Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao (BARMM), which includes Cotabato City, the seat of the Bangsamoro Government Center, it has remained steadfast in the performance of its mandate to uphold the primacy of peace.

Living up to their moniker "Laging Handa," the 1st Marine Brigade has sustained its operational readiness and continues to capacitate its forces through the conduct of various training programs. With the objective of combating peace spoilers within their area of operations, it recently carried out an intensive two-day Interoperability Training program for its Marine personnel at Camp Paulino Santos Firing Range, Brgy. Dado, Alamada, North Cotabato on June 8-9, 2023.

BEYOND ENHANCING INDIVIDUAL SKILLS Objective of the Interoperability Training

The training focused on honing the skills and coordination of the Marine Squad Rocket Launcher Light (SRLL) units as well as other operating units of the brigade to improve their efficiency and effectiveness. The exercises aimed to equip the Marine personnel with the capability, knowledge, and coordination required to neutralize threats. But beyond enhancing individual skills, learning to complement each other's strength through the synergy of their efforts, gives the 1st Marine Brigade the edge in maintaining peace and stability in their operational areas.



THE 4TH MARINE **BRIGADE FINDS A NEW HOME** IN NOLCOM



he attainment of peace in the Sulu Island Province highlights the 4th Marine "Makusug" Marine Brigade's crucial role in neutralizing hybrid threats for the past six years since its designation as the "Philippine Marine Ready Force (PMRF)-Sulu."

Despite being the youngest brigade of the Philippine Marine Corps (PMC), the 4th Marine Brigade was instrumental in the transformation of Sulu from being once tagged as a haven of terrorists, into a province that is on its way to economic development.

With threats now hounding the country's maritime zones in the north, higher headquarters redeployed the 4th Marine Brigade to keep watch over the nation's northern frontier.

Upon arrival at its new area of operations, the 4th Marine Brigade leadership expeditiously prepositioned its operating forces in strategic locations, building on its 3DR concept of "Defend, Deny, Disrupt, and Recover," in line with the PMC's Archipelagic Defense Concept (ADC), and in keeping with the Northern Luzon Command's (NOLCOM) transition to a Territorial Defense Command. The 4th



Marine Brigade takes pride in being part of this pivotal strategic undertaking, as it enhances jointness and interoperability with the other Major Services, and pertinent government agencies and stakeholders

To ensure optimum operational readiness, the 4th Marine Brigade conducted unilateral exercises ("IRUGI" and "MAIKADUA") from the Brigade level, down to the Fire-Teams. Crucial to this exercise is the individual Marine competency; the capacity to adapt to an evolving security environment, and fast-changing warfare technology to internalize the 3DR concept in defense of the Northern Frontier. In addition, International Defense and Security Engagements such as the "BALIKATAN," Marine Air Support Activity (MASA), and "KAMANDAG" with the US Armed Forces and observers from allied countries such as Australia, Japan, United Kingdom, and South Korea further enhance the unit's interoperability with other forces. They also pave the way for the review and assessment of TTPs; exposure to modern technologies; the ability to incorporate current and future systems; and for facilities development.

Beyond the 4th Marine Brigade's role as Defenders of the North, they have been proactive in sustaining the cleared areas formerly influenced by the Communist Terrorist Group (CTG), by supporting Internal Security Operations (ISOs). They also play a Constabulary role in support of law enforcement operations (SLEOs) of the PNP; VIP Protection and Security Operations (VIPPSOs), and **Humanitarian Assistance and Disaster** Response Operations (HADROs). The 4th Marine Brigade likewise utilizes a public centric approach to further enhance the unit's community relations.

Process of Reactivation


Several essential elements were carefully considered for the reactivation of the Voyager:


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other items to geographically isolated and disadvantaged areas (GIDAs) of the province.

Without the marines and other law enforcement agencies in Balabac, we cannot achieve these breakthroughs ensuring that tourists have a peace of mind away from enemies of the State. According to Mr. Rommel Banlaoi, a security analyst and president of the Philippine Society for Intelligence and Security Studies stated that Balabac is a strategic location for the military because of the quality of its water which can host different types of submarines that is critical for marine defense operations anywhere in the region. (Guzman, 2023)The island is only one hundred sixty (160) miles southeast of the Mischief reef which is a part of the highly contested Spratly Island group. It is one of our sea lines of communication in which the waterway hosts trillions of dollars in global trade pass through each year. With that, our Marines mann different detachments in the islands of Marabon, Bancalaan, Mangsee, Bugsuk and Balabac, Narciso del Rosario Naval Station safeguarding the southwestern portion against any eventualities. And lastly, Balabac was identified as one of the "suitable and mutually beneficial" EDCA site for US troops to have access in which Filipinos and American forces can train side by side in preparation for any concerns relating to China's role in the region. The location can strengthen the interoperability of the US and Philippines which allow us to respond more seamlessly together to address a range of shared challenges in the Indo-Pacific region, according to the US Department of Defense. (Guzman, 2023). The members of 37th Marine Company, MBLT-7 currently operating in the municipality of Balabac is crucial to the development of these projects. These marines dedicated themselves for the service to the Filipino people and to our beloved country, Philippines.

MBLT-7: Defenders of the Last Frontier manifests that we are "Most Ready, Always Forward in the Defense and Security of our Maritime Nation". Your marines live up to the motto of the Philippine Marine Corps, "Karangalan, Katungkulan, Kabayanihan".

he Marine Security and Escort Group (MSEG) is the unit of the Philippine Marine Corps tasked to provide security to government installations and VIP personages. But on top of that, the unit has also been tasked to provide honor guards to one of the country's most iconic landmarks – the Jose Rizal Monument at Luneta Park in Ermita, Manila. The monument was built in honor of the country's national hero, Dr. Jose P. Rizal. The park itself is steeped in history as it is where Dr. Rizal was executed by the Spaniards on December 30, 1896.

Ever since the inception of the Marine Guard Battalion, the predecessor of MSEG, the personnel of the unit have been given the task of providing honor guards to the Marines, and just like the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier in Arlington National Cemetery, Virginia, USA, honor guards are detailed to stand guard at the Rizal monument in order to preserve its integrity. The honor guards are in charge of looking after the statue

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of our national hero. They make sure that respect is accorded the hero at all times. Each honor guard has a two-hour shift wherein he stands firm at the side of Dr. Rizal's monument.

Part of the routine duties of the Marines in Luneta Park is the changing of guards. This has become one of the highlights of the park's attractions and is highly anticipated by the public. People come to the park not only to view the monument, but to watch the changing of the guards where the Marines execute a series of close order drills with rifle as another set of guards relieve the former of their duty. But once a month, the personnel of MSEG conduct a changingof-the-quard exhibition wherein six personnel will showcase their skills in handling a rifle in front of an inspector who is also a Marine.

Aside from the changing-ofthe-guard, another anticipated event in Luneta Park is the Silent Drill Exhibition

of MSEG. Once a month, starting at 4 p.m., the public is treated to a 20 minute "silent drill" at the back of the Rizal monument. A precision drill exhibition without verbal command, it shows MSEG personnel perform a series of calculated drill movements and precise handling of their handpolished M-1 Garand rifles with nickel plated bayonets in an impressive display of skill and coordination. During the exhibition, the Marines perform normal and slow drill while drawing up various formations such as HI, ANCHOR, and the X formation while firing their rifles in between in a synchronized manner. The exhibition is a product of hard work and dedication in order to develop coordination, precision and chemistry. It takes months of grueling practice in order to give the spectators a perfect silent drill performance.

The changing-of-the-guard and silent

drill exhibitions was put on hold during the pandemic, but was brought back on September 24, 2023. This was followed by MSEG personnel once again performing the crowd-favorite silent drill in front of the public at the Luneta Park on on October 8, 2028, to the delight of the locals and tourists alike.

Ever since the task of providing honor guards has been given to the PMC, the

Ever since the task of providing honor guards has been given to the PMC, the Marines have been performing their duties diligently while adhering to the highest standards of military discipline. There was even an anecdote written by Teodoro Valencia wherein he praised the personnel guarding the monument stating, "After Typhoon "Yoling" ravaged Manila in 1969, all the trees in Rizal Park were down, the flowers were all blown away, and the shrubs in shambles. The only structures left standing were the monument of Rizal and the two Marine Guards."


Ensuring Heroism is Not Forgotten



o say that basketball is the favorite sport of Filipinos is truly an understatement. Through the years, basketball fanaticism in the country has bordered on the level of religion, much like football fandom is in Europe. The sport is a common topic among people especially when a big basketball event is held, such as the NBA Championship and of course, the recently concluded FIBA World Cup. FIBA was founded in 1950 and is held every four years with 32 countries competing for the coveted title.

Though the Philippine team did not win the gold medal, it was still a proud

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moment for Filipino fans who were able to host the event together with Japan and Indonesia. The Philippines was given the honor of hosting the championship game which really thrilled the thousands who watched in the venue and the millions more who were watched the live coverage in their television sets, laptops, and mobile phones. The FIBA World Cup was a historic moment, for the possibility of hosting would probably only come in 48 years. This year's competition ran from August 25 to September 10, 2023, and the games in the Philippines were held at the Mall of Asia Arena in Pasay City and the Smart Araneta Coliseum in Quezon

City, while the opening was held at the Philippine Arena in Santa Maria, Bulacan.

If the Filipino fans felt lucky for having witnessed the competition in person or just shared in the basketball fanfare spirit, then there is no greater feeling of pride and joy than the ones felt by the Filipino children who were chosen to take part in the Wanda Little Champions Program. The program selects children from each host nation as Little Champions who are bestowed the honor of accompanying the players during the team presentations, before the tip off. A total of 192 children ages 8 to 14 years old volunteered for the program.

Through the efforts of the Makati Medical Center Foundation, Inc., one of the foundations under the MVP Group of Companies, 24 children of our Navy and Marine officers and enlisted personnel were chosen to present the teams competing on August 28, 2023. The MMC Foundation is headed by Dr. Victor L. Gisbert with Ms. Marge Macasaet-Barro as the Executive Director. The foundation is a reliable partner and supportive stakeholder of the Philippine Marine Corps. Another significant person who contributed to the children's wonderful experience BGen. Rodylyn Manzano PN(M)(RES) whose collaboration with the MMC Foundation made their participation possible.

The children were all set on the morning of August 28 and were transported to the staging area at Novotel adjacent to the Smart Araneta Coliseum, the venue for the games

between China and South Sudan, which was followed by Serbia against Puerto Rico. The parents did not accompany their children during the matches, but just like true basketball fans, they could not keep their excitement as the children will have a chance to walk beside notable NBA players such as Kyle Anderson of the Minnesota Timberwolves who was playing for China, Wenyen Gabriel of the Los Angeles Lakers and Carlik Jones of the Chicago Bulls who were playing for South Sudan, and of course, the more popular Bogdan Bogdanovic of the Atlanta Hawks and Nikola Jovic of the Miami Heat who were playing for Serbia, one of the eventual contenders for the gold medal.

Before the game, the children were each given a complete set of uniform. Moments before the game, they were escorted towards the arena in order to rehearse for the team presentation. After a short while they were partnered with their respective players and walked side by side towards center court and stood respectively as each team's national anthem played. After the tip off, they were also given a chance to watch the matches. Loud cheers were heard from the little champions as they shouted their hearts out in support of their respective teams.


I saw that shining buckle and the shimmering anchor of the campaign hat. I heard a shout like a thunderstorm that made me tremble.
